Oregon Air Quality Mixed, Finds American Lung Association's 2015 'State of the Air' Report

More can be done to protect public health in Oregon

Portland, OR April 30, 2015— The American Lung Association's [State of the Air 2015](#) report shows that Oregon's ozone levels have improved but that particle pollution has worsened in many areas of the state. Portland and Eugene are two cities that reported worse year-round particle pollution than in previous years, though they remain below the current national standards.

This year's "State of the Air" report analyzed data collected from 2011-2013, and short-term particle pollution presented a more serious problem this year than in the 2014 report. Lane County experienced worsened short-term particle pollution, largely due to high seasonal woodstove smoke readings in the Oakridge area, about 40 miles east of Eugene. Lane County, the only county in the Eugene data collection area, increased its unhealthy particle days from 3.3 in 2010-2012 to 5.0 days in this year's report.

The collection area of Lake County had its worst average number of unhealthy particle pollution days since the report began 16 years ago, reporting 9.3 days unhealthy air days versus 3.2 days in last year's report. It ranks as the 22nd most polluted county for short-term particle pollution in the nation. Jackson and Klamath counties also received failing grades for short-term particle pollution.

The Portland-Vancouver-Salem measurement area also reported increased unhealthy days of short-term particle pollution, worsening in national rankings and now tied for 28th most polluted region in the country. Areas of this region are also notable for year-round particle pollution, as Washington County has seen levels rise to 8.2 µg/m³ in 2011-2013, from 7.3 µg/m³ in 2010-2012. It is now the most polluted county in this data collection area for year-round particle pollution.

The main reason for the higher particle counts in the Portland metro area and other parts of the state may be attributed to woodstove smoke, said air quality officials from the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality. The year 2013 was an exceptionally bad period for particle pollution in many Oregon communities because of cold weather and prolonged air stagnation over much of the state, they noted. Air stagnation coupled with topography can add to high particulate levels in some communities. Oakridge, which for many years has reported some of the state's highest particulate levels in Lane County, is located in a bowl-like setting where pollution is more easily trapped during air stagnation periods.

DEQ and the Lane Regional Air Protection Agency continue to work with communities to address localized air pollution issues such as woodstove smoke, diesel pollution and air toxics.

Nationwide, more than 4 in 10 Americans – nearly 138.5 million people – live in counties where ozone or particle pollution levels make the air unhealthy to breathe, according to [State of the Air 2015](#). The 16th annual national report card, which looks at data around air pollution (both particle pollution and ozone pollution) from 2011-2013, shows that improvement in the nation's air quality was mixed, with

many cities experiencing strong improvements, others suffering increasingly unhealthy air, and a few cities experiencing their worst number of unhealthy days yet.

“Too many of our communities continue to have too many days with unhealthy particle pollution, and these days are especially harmful for those with lung disease, like asthma or COPD,” said Carrie Nyssen, Vice President for Advocacy and Air Quality at the American Lung Association of the Mountain Pacific. “Reducing pollution will only become more challenging as warmer temperatures increase the risk for ozone and particle pollution and make cleaning up the air harder in the future. We need stronger air quality standards to limit pollution as well as continued cleanup of the current sources of pollution in Oregon to protect our health.”

Reports on ozone pollution levels were more positive: The Eugene area data collection area reported no days with unhealthy levels of ozone, so it remains on the list of cleanest cities in the nation for ozone, as in the 2013 and 2014 reports. Multnomah County records the most ozone pollution in the metro area, but only 0.3 days on average, which is the same as in 2010-2012. This maintains the fewest days on average since the report began.

Each year, *State of the Air* analyzes data gathered on particle pollution (both 24-hour and annual) and ozone. Particle pollution levels can spike dangerously for hours to weeks on end (short-term) or remain at unhealthy levels on average every day (year-round). Particle pollution can penetrate deep into the lungs and even into the bloodstream where it can lead to premature deaths, asthma attacks and heart attacks, and lung cancer. Ozone is associated with premature death from cardiovascular disease, stroke and respiratory illnesses, as well as damage to the central nervous and reproductive systems.

“We’ve seen the health benefits that have come with cleaning up the air, and the EPA must move forward to fully implement the Clean Air Act for all pollutants that threaten public health,” added Nyssen. “This includes finalizing a strong Clean Power Plan to limit carbon pollution from power plants and stronger ozone air quality standards. Congress must also ensure that the provisions under the Clean Air Act are protected, implemented and enforced. The EPA and every state must have adequate funding to monitor and protect our citizens from air pollution and new threats caused by increased temperatures.”

Outdoor air pollution, along with pesticides and radon, can enter our homes creating poor indoor air quality that is also linked to lung disease exacerbations and lung cancer. May is a peak season for asthma and allergy sufferers – a perfect time to raise awareness about the health risks associated with exposure to pollutants both indoors and outdoors.

May is Asthma Awareness Month. The American Lung Association in Oregon is working in partnership with Clean Energy Works – a non-profit home performance organization working to make homes as efficient and healthy as possible. Clean Energy Works offers a free 100 Point Performance Check, as home performance analysis for weatherization is a good way to assess home health, ensuring good ventilation and moisture control by looking for evidence of mold, carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, radon, pests and other allergens. More Safeguards Needed to Protect Health

The American Lung Association calls for several steps to safeguard the air everyone breathes:

- **Strengthen the outdated ozone standards.** The EPA must adopt an up-to-date ozone limit that follows the current health science and the law to protect human health. Strong standards will drive much needed cleanup of ozone pollution across the nation.

- **Adopt a strong final Clean Power Plan.** The EPA needs to issue tough final requirements to reduce carbon pollution from power plants.
- **Protect the Clean Air Act.** Congress needs to ensure that the protections under the Clean Air Act remain effective and enforced. States should not be allowed to “opt out” of Clean Air Act protections.
- **Fund the work to provide healthy air.** Congress needs to adequately fund the work of the EPA and the states to monitor and protect the nation from air pollution.

Background

The American Lung Association’s *State of the Air 2015* report uses the most recent quality-assured air pollution data, collected by federal, state and local governments and tribes in 2011, 2012, and 2013. These data come from official monitors for the two most widespread types of pollution—ozone and particle pollution. The report grades counties, ranking cities and counties based on scores calculated by average number of unhealthy days (for ozone and for short-term particle pollution) and by annual averages (for year-round particle pollution).

Dear Mr. Parker and Ms. Jolly:

I have discussed the privacy question you raised with the Town Council at the Town Council Meeting of April 28, 2015 with our Town attorney. As I recall, you are concerned about videotaping by security cameras located on your neighbor's property.

The Town has no ordinances that apply to the circumstance you raise. There is no specific Town of Lakeview restriction on the use of video recording equipment. That is to say, video equipment that may record the use of the public sidewalks, streets or alleys which are the responsibility of the Town is not prohibited or regulated by the Town of Lakeview. Accordingly, there should be no expectation of privacy in public areas.

The issue of the privacy of your private property, other than the publicly visible areas, is not addressed or regulated by Town ordinance.

In summary because the issues raised are not regulated by the Town, you may want to consider pursuing your civil remedies in the Lake County Circuit Court..



MANAGER'S REPORT

April 2015

As is the yearly ritual, April is budget preparation month! Three items that are reoccurring themes from past years are that we are going to need to shore up funding for 911 for the 2016-17 year. We should be okay for the 2015-16 year. We are getting by with street funding but it is not adequate to have an adequate for long term. Although we are okay for now, our streets are all about the same age because of the major paving project of the late 1990's so they will tend to need more maintenance, mostly all at once. Through crack sealing and attention to utility cuts they are holding up, but, the day is coming. Also, Parks, and in particular the swimming pool, requires more money than it is able to generate. Fortunately, we have other resources to supplement with.

The good news is that if Red Rock or the Greenhouse project or both come to pass, new revenues will become available to the Town and future budget committees will have an opportunity to help decide how to use.

The potential new project in our community this month is "The 42nd Group" and their greenhouse operation. I have met with them twice after first learning of the project in early April. I also attended their public meeting at the Senior Center. I expect them to be back again in May for further discussion about the project and specific discussion about their utility needs including water, sewer, irrigation and geothermal.

Red Rock continues to work through the permitting processes they face. Next up is the public hearing on their Air Quality Permit. Oregon DEQ will conduct that hearing at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday May 14th at the Senior Center. They are working on the UGB adjustment as well as wetlands and NEPA. We continue to have weekly conference calls with Red Rock, State Agency Staff and Town and County staff.


The "Mainstreet" group met a couple of times in April. They are going to meet again in early May to discuss organizational matters and options with an Attorney and CPA. They are anxious to get going but they need to get some of these preliminary issues taken care of first.

On April 22nd, 23rd and 24th, I attend a heritage preservation conference at Coos Bay. In addition to some Mainstreet discussions, I attended sessions regarding planning for, and preserving a community's heritage. I also attended a session about the current effort of Oregon Parks and Recreation Department and the University of Oregon work on inventorying historic theaters across Oregon and the need to preserve them. The Alger was the focus of a short video with Colin Samples discussing his family's involvement with it. It was a bit overwhelming this first time but preserving and marketing a community's heritage is taking on new emphasis for many places across Oregon and the nation.

During April there was another review of the Headstart building design. There were two SCOEDD conference call meetings. Also the Red Rock conference calls are continuing almost every week. The Lake County Economic Development Advisory Committee met in April also. I attended a CHIP meeting as well as a Historical Society meeting to name a few.

I continue to meet with our Planning Official, Attorney and Engineer regularly as well as Department Heads.

The Council watched the video, which was approximately 15 minutes long.

Michael Hughes asked if CIS is mainly focused on HR issues.

Mr. Rucker stated that they are not focused on HR issues. However, a lot of effort is on limiting the amount of risk when it comes to employees with things such as wrongful termination and discrimination issues.

Andrew Rucker spoke of the premium structure. Even though the Town's experience may be good, the premiums are based on the experience of the Trust. CIS provides many avenues to help trust members manage their risk.

Mr. Rucker informed the Council that there is a pre-loss legal team always available. Also the CIS website also has a lot of information. Ray Simms added that he uses the pre-loss service, especially with regards to employment related issues.

Andrew Rucker shared with the Council some other ways that will help the Town save some money on premiums in future years:

- 1) Form an executive risk management team and meet at least 4 times a year.
- 2) Online learning curriculum
- 3) Continuity of operation plan

Mr. Rucker thanked the Council for their time and expressed to them that he appreciates the work they have to do.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Orlando Gonzales shared with the council a few concerns that he has.

Mr. Gonzales read in the Lake County Examiner an article regarding the updates that are going to be taking place at Town Hall; he is very concerned that the sidewalks were not added to the updates.

Mr. Gonzales stated that the public should be aware of this. He mentioned possibly posting in the newspaper.

Mr. Gonzales questioned if the police vehicle parked between two barriers at the fire station is broken down or why it might be parked there.

Matt Gray informed Mr. Gonzales that it is the chief's vehicle and that it is currently not in use. Mr. Gonzales suggested it might be better to park it on the back lot.

William Parker discussed that he has come to share with the Council the issues he and his neighbors continue to have with a fellow neighbor.

Mr. Parker expressed to the Council the concern he has with a fellow neighbor and that he feels they are invading his privacy. He stated that they have cameras on the outside of their home pointed directly into surrounding neighbors yards including his.

Sandra Wenzel questioned if the Town is aware of this concern.

Ray Simms stated that this concern had been brought to the attention of the Town before and he needs to discuss the matter with the Town's legal counsel before coming to a conclusion.

Matt Gray spoke to the Council letting them know he has seen the surveillance system and in fact it does point directly into Mr. Parker's yard.

Orlando Gonzales speaks of some concerns.

William Parker speaks about some privacy issues.

Privacy issue discussed.

Mr. Parker informed the Council all he is asking is that the cameras be lowered so that they are not pointing into his yard. He is not requesting them to be removed.

William Parker than presented pictures to the Council showing what the cameras were showing.

Diane Jolly, another neighbor informed the Council that the problem is not that there are only 1 or 2 cameras but in fact there are 12 cameras located on the property.

The Council reassured Mr. Parker and Mrs. Jolly that they would seek advice from the legal counsel regarding this issue.

Matt Gray did discuss that from what he understands much of the water at the greenhouse will be in a recycled system so little will be used after initial draw.

Michael Hughes stated that the water use as compared to that of alfalfa for example, is very minor.
